FAW is one of the top 10 devastating plant pests affecting global food and agriculture (CABI, 2018)








Invasion and Distribution

Global Action and its Characters

- Big coverage of regions: 3 FAO regions (Africa, Asia-Pacific and Near East), 3 IPPC RPPOs (IAPSC, NEPPO, and PPPO), and over 80 countries
- Big coverage of disciplines: From quarantine, IPM, and pesticides to plant resistance, cropping, and healthy cultivation
- Big coverage of stakeholders: Government, extension, research, private sectors, and development partners










National Implementation

- IPM: Eight demonstration countries have been identified to implement IPM strategy in Africa, Asia and Near East, and they are representing 8 ecological zones and over 50% of maize in the three region, through which 53 pilot countries will be facilitated
- Prevention: 21 countries have been identified to implement prevention strategy in South Europe,
 South Pacific and Near East








◆ 8 demonstration and 53 pilot countries for FAW IPM



Way Forward

- **Development of guidance on prevention:** Drafting and validating guidance on FAW prevention
- Training on pest risk assessment: Organizing national and regional training courses for trainers on FAW pest risk assessment and border control
- Implementation of preventive measures:
 Implementing preventive measures and FAW outbreak and alert system at national level
