Concept Note: How to Strengthen National Legislation to Support Electronic Phytosanitary Certification in COMESA countries

CONCEPT NOTE: HOW TO STRENGTHEN NATIONAL LEGISLATION TO SUPPORT ELECTRONIC PHYTOSANITARY CERTIFICATION IN COMESA COUNTRIES

1. Background

- [1] Phytosanitary certificates are official documents issued by the National Plant Protection Organisations (NPPOs) of exporting countries to the NPPOs of importing countries to certify that plants, plant products and regulated articles have been inspected before exportation and found to be free from pests and compliant with the importation requirements of the country of importation.
- Phytosanitary certificates have historically been issued in paper format but, over the past decade, an increasing number of countries have transitioned their certification system to an electronic documentation environment or a hybrid environment where paper certificates and ePhyto coexist.

2. Rationale

- [3] Electronic certification is recognized by Article V.2(b) of the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC) as a valid means of exchanging phytosanitary information between exporting and importing countries. Implementation of an electronic certification system in a country requires the national legislation to be updated to reflect their adherence to the new electronic system and to expressly recognize the validity of ePhytos.
- [4] As part of the FAO support to Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) trade facilitation programme, a study was conducted on the legal aspects of introducing ePhyto in the context of five pilot COMESA countries, namely Kenya, Malawi, Uganda, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. The following documents were produced to support these countries with the integration of ePhyto into national legislation:
 - Guidelines for Drafting National Regulation on Electronic Phytosanitary Certification
 - Model Regulations on Electronic Phytosanitary Certification

3. Content, objectives and expected outcomes of the webinar

- [5] This webinar is based on the above mentioned Guidelines for Drafting National Regulation on Electronic Phytosanitary Certification, and the Model Regulations on Electronic Phytosanitary Certification.

 - support five pilot COMESA countries in integrating ePhyto into their respective national legislation;
 - guide five pilot COMESA countries in harmonizing national legislation with international standards on ePhyto;
 - present ePhyto success story and create a platform to learn and share experience on ePhyto for 21 COMESA countries.
