# Focus Group on Safe Provision of Food and Other Humanitarian Aid

Virtual Meeting 12 October 2022

**IPPC Secretariat** 

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### 1. Opening of the Meeting

### 1.1 Welcome by the IPPC Secretariat

[1] The Standard Setting Officer, Adriana G. MOREIRA, from the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC) Secretariat (hereafter referred to as "the secretariat"), welcomed the participants to the first virtual meeting of the CPM Focus Group on Safe Provision of Food and Other Humanitarian Aid.

- The IPPC Secretary, Osama EL-LISSY, thanked all the experts and members of this focus group and wished success in their work on this important topic. He reinforced the aims of IPPC to protect plants by preventing the introduction and spread of pests, facilitate safe trade and safeguarding agriculture. He also mentioned the importance of international standards for phytosanitary measures and the expectations towards this focus group to provide quality work, which will lean on the support of the secretariat.
- [3] The participants gave a brief self-introduction focused on their professional background and prospects for the focus group.

### 1.2 Review of the terms of reference (ToR) of the Focus Group

[4] The secretariat reminded the participants about the Terms of Reference (ToR) to follow, the commitment of the focus group and the current timeline, where it is foreseen that the group will remain active until the Commission on Phytosanitary Measures (CPM-18) in 2024.

### 2. Meeting arrangements

### 2.1 Election of the Chairperson of the Focus Group

[5] The focus group members <u>selected</u> Christopher DALE (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australia) as chairperson of this meeting. The election of the chairperson of the focus group was postponed to the next focus group meeting, when it is expected to have the presence of all members.

#### 2.2 Selection of the Rapporteur

[6] The focus group members <u>selected</u> Lucien KOUAMÉ KONAN (Ministry of Agriculture, Ivory Coast) as rapporteur.

### 2.3 Adoption of the agenda

[7] The focus group members <u>adopted</u> the agenda (Appendix 1).

#### 3. Administrative matters

- The secretariat introduced the participants / membership list (Appendix 2) and invited the participants to notify the secretariat if any changes were needed to the information, as it is reflected in the <u>FGFA</u> membership list on the International Phytosanitary Portal (IPP <u>www.ippc.int</u>).
- [9] The secretariat acknowledged that the Standards Committee (SC) representative, Sophie PETERSON and Olive Juliet JAY TO-ALESANA (Samoa) were unable to attend this meeting.

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### 4. Focus Group work programme

# 4.1. Review of CPM recommendation on "Safe provision of food and other humanitarian aid to prevent the introduction of plant pests during an emergency situation"

- The chairperson presented the CPM recommendation<sup>1</sup> to the focus group members, asking for their comments and experiences regarding the issue. He commented that the countries' priority is to get people fed when experienced an emergency or disaster and that it is part of the IPPC community task to provide guidance and instructions to all parts involved in this chain, including personnel such as agencies workers, military and other officials, as well as materials (e.g., machinery, containers, etc.). He reported the emergency faced by Tonga in January 2022 due to a volcanic eruption and tsunami and all guidance provided by Australia to the agencies involved on food aid, regarding the aspects mentioned above.
- [11] Some members reported their experiences on receiving food aid that do not complied with phytosanitary requirements as plant products were carrying quarantine pests to the recipient countries, as well as regarding food safety and food quality aspects (e.g. expiration or validity date).
- [12] The chairperson commented that the Pacific Plant Protection Organization (PPPO) developed fact sheets to raise awareness on this issue, which could be shared with the group and the IPPC community in general.
- One member expressed that this is a very important issue and on the lack of resources of some National Plant Protection Organizations (NPPOs) to provide directions on how to manage the situation.
- One member reported an experience with transboundary shipments due to a drought emergency in Eastern Africa. Some donations were stored in one country waiting to be re-shipped to another country, which could pose a risk of pest introduction, as normally any additional measures are taken in this situation. Another situation reported is the deviation of the intended use of these donations, such as grains and tubercles donated for consumption that are used for propagation, which also could raise the risk of introduction of a quarantine pest into the recipient country.
- [15] Some members also reported examples of pests that have the potential to be introduced and spread over humanitarian aid (e.g., *Spodoptera frugiperda*, *Fusarium oxysporum* f. sp cubense (Foc TR4), *Xylella fastidiosa* and many species of fruit flies).
- [16] One member commented that some humanitarian aid is being refused in Syria due to the presence of quarantine pests (mainly stored grains with nematodes).
- [17] Some questions were also posed by the group members. One member questioned what would be the best way to communicate with the donors. Another member asked about the certification of shipments to be donated and how to address this issue.

### 4.2. Review of the Pacific Plant Protection Organization (PPPO) submission for draft ISPM

- The chairperson presented the submission for draft ISPM proposed by the PPPO in 2021, providing the necessary justification for it. However, the CPM-16 did not reach consensus on this matter and this CPM focus group was created to identify the best way to address the issue (through an ISPM, a guide or other kind of material).
- [19] The group had a brief discussion, and some members reinforced the need to have instruments to raise awareness of the donor countries on the vulnerability of the recipients to identify and address the risks posed by food aid non-compliant with the phytosanitary requirements. They agreed that advocacy on this matter is also extremely important.
