



Strengthening phytosanitary compliance and public private partnership to boost seed trade in the Asia-Pacific region







Scope

- To address key SPS issues affecting regional seed trade, promote regional coordination and encourage collaboration among the countries.
- To strengthen the capabilities of the NPPOs of 7 countries (Bangladesh, Cambodia, Laos, Nepal, Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam) of Asia to carry out effective phytosanitary processes specifically for seed.
- To promote public-private collaborations under one forum to enhance SPS related compliance.
- Three-year project (Nov 2022 November 2025)







Relevance to the IPPC

- ✓ Using IPPC tools:
 - PCE to be used where available for assessing the capacity gaps.
- ✓ Capacity Building on relevant ISPMs:
 - Pest Risk Analysis for seed pests (ISPM 2 and 11)
 - ePhyto system in countries which do not yet have any process
 - Guidelines on international seed movement recommended under ISPM38
 - Third-party accreditation as recommended under ISPM45 to set up the example of public private partnership
- ✓ IPPC participation in the project's Steering Committee
- ✓ Opportunities for learning and potential replication:
 - Portal of seed pests; public private partnerships between NPPOs and Seed Industries









Main outputs

- Specific needs regarding existing infrastructure and capabilities of the NPPOs of the participating countries are identified
- A portal of phytosanitary requirements in English created and reviewed as necessary
- NPPO's knowledge on International Standards for Phytosanitary Measures (ISPMs) built
- The implementation of ePhyto is further facilitated in the region
- Public-Public and Public-Private Partnership platform strengthened and recognized









Success and challenges

- The project has only recently started.
- Key challenges have been identified which have direct relevance to the IPPC.
- Many countries in the project have not conducted their full PCE which makes it challenging to identify key capacity building needs.
- Countries' capacity needs have been assessed through a questionnaire designed for the purpose.
- A great sense of willingness has been observed both among NPPOs and private seed sectors to work together
