Reducing the Risk of Contamination of Sea Containers and their Cargo



- GSF supports the principles of the Safeguarding Continuum and Custodial Responsibility but with essential modifications.
- Initial bi-lateral discussion with WSC in producing a revised 'framework'
- Next steps requires extensive engagement with affected stakeholders to examine obligations and liabilities

Methods to Remove Contamination



- Revised guidance for the clearing of contamination from infested containers.
- Compilation of national contact points for 'calling-in' pest discoveries in containers.

Container Structure



- All-steel containers are the common goal
- Need to set timeframe to cease production of wooden floored containers to cease use in international transport
- In the interim, shippers would ideally receive key data to assess risk of allocated containers

Push-back, if supplied with a dirty container


Exclude pests from entering during packing

Store packed containers in 'clean' areas

Tell someone if you find evidence of pests

Raising Awareness

- Poster reminding of basic "Do's and Don'ts" for safe and clean packing of containers
- Intended to 'nudge' custodial responsibilities and safe packing procedures
- Graphical symbols to overcome language barrier
- QR Code links to container packing guidance CTU Code, Checklists, etc
- Micro-learning App



IPPC Engagement with Shippers



- The GSF Policy Council accepts our role in the Safeguarding Continuum and our share of Custodial Responsibility but that means IPPC now needs to engage with us as a key stakeholder in the process.
- In developing its proposals for global measures IPPC must be more open, inclusive and transparent if the pest transfer risk is to be comprehensively addressed and that secures the participation and confidence of the key players.
