

Why set international standards?



Contracting parties have access to a same level of playing field upon which all can safely trade plants and plant products.



The aim of **international standards is to harmonize phytosanitary measures**.



Facilitate **safe international trade**, protect the **environment** and ensure **food security**.





International Plant Protection Convention



Phytosanitary measures: basic principles



- Only when necessary
- No more restrictive than necessary
- Technical justification
- Minimal impact
- Non-discrimination (→Equivalence of phytosanitary measures)
- Transparency

ISPM1 - Phytosanitary principles for the protection of plants and the application of phytosanitary measures in international trade (adopted in 1993, revised in 2006)







In practice, what does the IPPC do?

 The IPPC <u>develops</u> International Standards for Phytosanitary Measures (ISPMs), CPM recommendations and facilitates their <u>implementation</u> to ensure food security, facilitate safe trade and reduce the risks to agriculture and biodiversity.







Consists of 25 members from each of the seven FAO regions

Standards Committee (SC)

Oversees the IPPC Standard Setting Process

Provides guidance and oversight to the work of Expert Drafting Groups



International Plant Protection Convention





Assigns a lead Steward and assistant(s) for each topic

Reviews draft Specification

Approves draft Specification for consultation period

Makes draft Specification publicly available

Solicits comments through <u>Online Comment System</u> (OCS) <u>90 days</u> Comments received: compiles \rightarrow makes publicly available \rightarrow submits to Steward and to SC for consideration

Revises and approves Specification

Makes Specification publicly available



International Plant Protection Convention





Issues call for experts – Nominations for EWG or TP members from NPPOs and RPPOs

Drafts or revises draft ISPM in accordance with Specification

Reviews draft ISPM at the meetings (for DP or PT, electronically)

Decides:


- to approve the ISPM for consultation
- to return it to Steward or EDG or
- to put it on hold





International Plant Protection Convention





Draft ISPM approved by SC for 1st consultation \rightarrow makes publicly available

Solicits comments through the **Online Comment System** (OCS)

Compiles comments and makes publicly available \rightarrow submits to Steward for consideration

Reviews and prepares responses to comments + revises draft ISPM → submits to IPPC Secretariat

Records responses to major issues in SC-7 meeting report

Approves draft ISPM for 2nd consultation

Draft ISPM approved by SC for 2nd consultation \rightarrow makes publicly available



Adopting and publication

(Stage 4)



Adopted ISPM, PT or DP is made publicly available

CPs and **RPPOs** may form a **Language Review Group (LRG)** \rightarrow proposes adjustments*

to translations of adopted ISPMs

*These adjustments are noted at next CPM session



SC to CPM-18: Recommending <u>FOUR</u> ISPMs for adoption

(Agenda Item 10)

- Draft annex Criteria for evaluation of available information for determining host status of fruit to fruit flies to ISPM 37 (Determination of host status of fruit to fruit flies ((Tephritidae)) (2018-011)
- **Draft revision of ISPM 4** (Requirements for the establishment of pest free areas) (2009-002)
- Draft annex to ISPM 28 (Cold treatment for Thaumatotibia Ieucotreta on Citrus sinensis) (2017-029)
- **Draft 2022 amendments to ISPM 5** (Glossary of phytosanitary terms) (1994-001)

IPPC Standard Setting Process main steps and calendar

Submitting topics	Call for topics (every 2 years) *SC and CPM	Next call in 2025: May to August
Submitting phytosanitary treatments	Open call	On going call (via IPP)
SC nominations	1 time per year	CPM sessions - Letter for nominations
Experts' nominations	Throughout the year	Call for experts: EWGs, Technical Panels, DP drafting groups (authors)
SC meetings	3 times per year	SC May, SC-7 (May) and SC November
Consultation period for draft Specifications and ISPMs (via OCS)	1 time per year (90 days)*	01 July – 30 September
	*For draft DPs: 2 times per year	*For draft DPs: 30 January – 03 May
Consultation period for CPM Recommendations (via OCS)	1 time per year (90 days)	01 July – 30 September
Expert consultation on draft DPs	Throughout the year (at least 30 days)	(via IPP)
DP Notification period (adoption process for draft DPs) (via IPP)	2 times per year (45 days)	01 July – 15 August 05 January – 20 February
Adoption of ISPMs	1 time per year	CPM sessions


