Background

During an **emergency situation**, for example when **natural disasters** happen, conditions at borders can be very abnormal and contracting parties and their national plant protection organizations (NPPOs) usually face challenges to **effectively manage pest risk.**



Reduction or absence of (for example):

- inspection and diagnosis: lack of personnel due to inability to travel or diverted to emergency
- equipment and infrastructure being inaccessible: e.g. water, electricity, roads and ports









Background (cont'd)

During an **emergency situation**, usually the affected country (recipient) receives **humanitarian aid** from other countries (donors).



To recall that, in emergency crisis situations, affected countries can be temporarily constrained in their ability to implement their phytosanitary responsibilities.

It has been recognized that the **provision of aid** supplies **could bring pests** which can cause **mid- and long-term impacts** on the economy, environment and communities.











What is the IPPC doing?

The IPPC recognizes the necessity for international co-operation to prevent the global spread of plant pests, as outlined in Article IV of the Convention text.

IPPC has an adopted CPM Recommendation on "<u>Safe provision of food and other humanitarian aid to prevent the introduction of plant pests during an emergency situation (R-09)</u>": it applies the principle of phytosanitary **preparedness** and **response** to the provision of urgent **disaster-relief assistance** and encourages recipient and exporting countries to develop adequate response plans and use guidance available in adopted standards.

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


What is the IPPC doing?

However, the IPPC community acknowledges that more is needed.

Given the:

- predicted increase in frequency of natural disasters
- potential man-made disasters, and
- the historical incidence of pest introductions through humanitarian aid













What is the IPPC doing?

CPM-16 (2022) established a **CPM focus group** on this matter to:

- support the objectives of the IPPC strategic framework 2030;
- to enhance global food security and;
- to protect the environment from the impacts of plant pests and, where appropriate, environmental pests.



→ It came from countries request to **try to address the gaps** in **phytosanitary processes**, with the intention to **potentially develop an international standard** on this topic.

Gaps in the current suite of ISPMs



Elaborate an action plan in collaboration with WOAH, CODEX and WFP



Complexity of the topic: there is a need for a suite of materials and tools



Develop communications and advocacy material



Donor agencies (e.g. WFP, FAO) and partners engagement



Developed of a revised draft
Specification for an ISPM (currently under consultation period)







CPM focus group on "safe aid" – following CPM 18



CPM focus group on "safe aid" at their face-toface meeting in Nadi, Fiji 2023



- CPM-18 (2024) extended the mandate of the focus group until CPM-20 (2026).
- Additional tasks were included in the group's terms of reference.
- Financial contributions received from Australia.
- IPPC secretariat issued a call for additional experts (May-June).
- Tentative next meeting: 07-11 October 2024.
