# The IPPC and the National Reporting Obligations (NROs)

Purpose

The purpose of the Convention is "international cooperation in controlling pests of plants and plant products and in preventing their international spread, and especially their introduction into endangered areas" (*Preamble*)

Obligations

"Each contracting party shall assume responsibility, without prejudice to obligations under other international agreements, for the fulfilment within its territories of all requirements under this Convention"

(Art. 1.2)



The reason for having NROs is to ensure that a minimum amount of official phytosanitary information is available for ensuring safe trade, safeguarding food security and protecting the environment from plant pests







# **Brief introduction to the NROs concept**

NROs are provisions within the Convention designed to ensure that all Contracting Parties (CPs) are accountable for fulfilling reporting obligations. There are two categories of NROs:

- 13 NROs: 7 public and 6 bilateral
- Public NROs: They should be reported via the International Phytosanitary Portal (IPP): <a href="https://www.ippc.int">https://www.ippc.int</a>
- Bilateral NROs: These obligations are communicated directly between CPs. However, countries have the option to display bilateral NROs on the IPP.


